STOCKPORT is an extensive parish, market town, and borough, both corporate and parliamentary, at the junction of the Mersey with the Tame, 38 miles N.E. by E. from Chester, 6 miles S.E. from Manchester, and 179 miles from London by road. It is $5\frac{3}{4}$ miles S.E. from Manchester, $11\frac{1}{2}$ N. from Macclesfield, 46 N.E. by E. from Chester, 79 N. by W. from Birmingham, and $19\frac{1}{4}$ N.W. by N. from London; these distances are by railway. The parish contains the chapelries of Disley-Stanley, Dukinfield, Hyde, Marple, Norbury, Romily or Chadkirk, with the townships of Bramall, Bredbury, Brinnington, Etchells or Stockport Etchells, Offerton, Torkington, and Werneth. Much controversy has arisen among etymologists and antiquaries upon the derivation of the name of the town, the spelling of which is at variance with all the old authorities. In the twelfth century it was written *Stopport*, most probably a corruption from *Stokeport*; at a subsequent period it was spelled *Stopworth*, and in a deed three centuries ago it is written *Stopford*. Its great antiquity is undoubted. Although not mentioned in the Domesday Survey, there is little but what it was then a military position, and at an early period was the grand centre of many diverging Roman roads.

The Market-place and Parish Church are seated on the summit of a hill, affording a level of considerable extent. This ground consists of a solid rock of a soft freestone, with an extremely deep descent on the north, towards the Mersey; part of the northern side is perpendicular for a height equal to that of the houses, of which a row encircles the base of the hill, having their backs to it, and concealing it from the view of passengers. Some of these houses have apartments hollowed out of the solid rock, and the appearance of the whole to one who surveys it closely is very singular. On the summit of the rock is an upper row of houses, completely encircling the Market-place, which is spacious and convenient." The Market-place and the various streets radiating from it contain an immense number of handsome shops, stocked with a profusion of goods, in all the different branches of the retail trade. A short distance from the Market-place is the Rectory House, a good brick residence, facing down Churchgate; it stands on elevated ground, from which there is a fine view of the whole town and surrounding country, and hence is seen a pleasing view of the meanderings of the Mersey in the vale below. A fine old structure of wood and plaster, in the Underbank, was for several centuries the occasional residence of the Ardernes of Arden Hall. It is now occupied as a branch bank by the Manchester and Liverpool Banking Company. Portwood, an eastern suburb to the town of Stockport, from which it is separated by the river Mersey, consists of numerous lanes and streets, which intersect each other nearly at right angles, amongst which are several very extensive cotton mills; it is situated in the township of Brinnington, with which it is more particularly noticed.

Stockport, though greatly improved within the last thirty years, has all the characteristics of a manufacturing town; it is irregularly built upon ground in some parts precipitous, with an ascent from the north. Around this precipitous acclivity, and along the south bank of the river, the houses rise in successive amphitheatrical tiers from the base to the summit in a very romantic form, while the surrounding scenery is bold and picturesque. The town with its numerous and extensive factories elevated above each other, when lighted up during the winter evenings, present an appearance of striking grandeur, especially when approached from the north. Among the improvements in Stockport, the Wellington road stands most conspicuous. This fine thoroughfare extends from Heaton Church to Rowcroft Smithy; it avoids the narrow and sudden turnings and precipitous ascents and declivities of the town, and crosses the Mersey without descending from the high grounds on either side to the level

of the vale of that river, This has been effected by the construction of a noble bridge of eleven arches, across the valley and the river, of which nine are on the Cheshire and two on the Lancashire side of the Mersey; the arch over the river has a span of more than ninety feet, and an elevation of forty feet above the water; it was built of the white freestone from the quarries of Saddleworth and Runcorn. The two arches on the Lancashire side have each a span of twenty-seven feet, and those on the Cheshire side are carried over several of the streets, having thoroughfares underneath. From the last arch the road is carried for a considerable distance over an artificial embankment, formed of earth cut from the hill through which it passes, to its junction with the Warrington road, near which it again joins the old road at Heaviley, at the distance of nearly three miles from its commencement. The road throughout is twenty-four yards in width, and was opened to the public in 1826 with a splendid procession on the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo, hence it is called Waterloo road. The improvement act was obtained in 1824, and the road and bridge were completed in less than two years, at an expense of £40,000.

The conveyance of merchandise and passengers to all parts of the kingdom is facilitated by the Manchester and Birmingham branch of the London and North-Western Railway, which literally passes over the town, parallel with the Wellington road, on the arches of a magnificent viaduct, the extreme length of which is 1780 feet, or about one-third of a mile, and the width of the road between the parapets, 28 feet, affords ample space for two lines of railway. It has twenty-two semicircular arches, each 63 feet span, four of 20 span, and two at each abutment. Its height to the surface of the rails is 106 feet from the bed of the river, or 111 feet to the top of the battlement, being six feet higher than the celebrated Menai bridge in Wales. The foundation-stone was laid on the 10th of March, 1839, and the work was completed on the 21st of December, 1840. The quantity of stone used in the erection is above 400,000 cubic feet, whilst the number of bricks consumed exceeds 11,000,000. These bricks, laid end-ways, would describe a distance equivalent to 568 miles and 32 yards, or to the measurement by turnpike from the remotest place in Northumberland to London, and back again. The cost was about £70,000, a saving of £50,000 having been effected in the whole line to Manchester by increasing the altitude of the viaduct to the present plan. The line between this town and Manchester was opened on the 4th of June, 1839. The canal to Manchester, in uniting with the Duke of Bridgewater's Navigation at that town, effects a means of water communication with the principal rivers and canals in England, and affords additional convenience for the transmission of the industrial product of this busy town. The township contains 1,740 acres of land, and in 1841 had 5,606 inhabited houses, 1,179 houses unoccupied, and 12 building; with a population of 28,431 souls, of whom 13,449 were males and 14,982 females; population in 1801, 14,830; in 1831, 27,074.

Stockport was anciently incorporated; and, previous to the passing of the Municipal Act in 1835, it still retained a mayor, constables, and other officers, but the office of mayor was almost nominal, the town being under the jurisdiction of the county magistrates, who sat daily in the court house, and held petty sessions every other week. Courts Leet and Baron held twice a year by the steward of the lord of the manor, with a jurisdiction co-extensive with the township of Stockport, were the only local courts, till a Court of Requests for the recovery of debts to the amount of £5, was established in 1806, by act 46 Geo. III. c. 114, with the mayor and others as commissioners, and a jurisdiction extending over the townships of Stockport and Brinnington, and the hamlets of Edgeley and Brinksway. An act of parliament for the police regulation of the town passed 7 Geo. IV. 1826. Another act for improving and regulating the borough of Stockport, was passed in 1837. On the 22nd July, 1847, another improvement act was obtained, intituled "An act to purchase and define the manorial and market rights of Stockport, to establish public parks, to purchase and lease waterworks, to build bridges, and to make other communications within the borough of Stockport."

By the municipal act, the borough of Stockport was placed under the government of 14 aldermen, and 12 councillors, with the corporate style of the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Stockport. The borough was included in Schedule A amongst those to have a commission of the peace, which has accordingly been granted, and in Section I of that Schedule, amongst those the Parliamentary boundaries, of which were to

be taken for municipal purposes. These comprehend the township of Stockport, the hamlets of Brinksway, and Edgeley with Portwood, a part of the town situated in Brinnington township, and also part of the township of Heaton Norris, situated in Lancashire. The borough is divided into six wards, and at the last census comprised a population of 50,696 souls. The expenditure for the year ending September 1st 1848 was £3,229 13s. 10d. The amount is chiefly raised by a borough rate. The following is a list of the Members of Parliament, Borough Magistrates, and the Corporate body for 1849.

In the ancient history of this town, a vast deal of speculation must almost necessarily be embraced. Although not noticed in the great survey of Domesday, there is little doubt but that it was then a military station, and had been so from the period when the Roman legions settled in Chester and Manchester. That there are no records to determine its origin, is a proof of its antiquity. It is probable that on the Danish and Norman invasions, a great part of this district was depopulated by them, and that Stockport suffered severely in the general devastation. If the hints given by Mr. Whittaker are well founded, it is ancient indeed. "The town of Stockport," says this gentleman, "appears the one common centre to three or four very variously directed roads of the Romans. The High street advances to it from Manchester, and the Pepper street hastens to it from Handford; and in the parish of Ashton, and near the foot of Stayley Bridge, is a third road, commonly denominated Stayley street, for a mile together, the main line of which lies pointing clearly from Castleshaw to Stockport. These are sure signatures of a Roman station. This must have been fixed upon as the castle, and was the area of the Castle hill, at Stockport. That is exactly such a site as the Romans must have instantly selected for such a station; that is, a small area, detached from the level of the Market place, and connected with it only by an isthmus. The area must have been the actual site of the castle in the earliest period of the Saxon residence

amongst us, as the castle must have originally communicated its name to the town, and as both were denominated Stockport, because the former was a fort or castle in the wood. The area is about half a statute acre in extent. The site is still incomparably strong in itself, and the position is highly fitted for the ford. The station must have had a steep of one hundred or one hundred and twenty yards upon three sides of it, and must have been guarded by a foss across the isthmus. The Roman road from East Cheshire must have been effectually commanded by it, being obliged, by the circular current of the Mersey, to approach very near to the castle, and being evinced, by the remaining steepness of the neighbouring banks, to have actually ascended the brow, in a hollow immediately below the eastern side of it."

More might be urged in proof of there being a *castrum* in Stockport in the time of the Romans, if the point was not sufficiently established; and that a fortress was maintained here in Saxon times, the very name of the place demonstrates. This opinion is further confirmed by the tradition that the Danes were repulsed here, and great numbers of them slain; and a field below the castle, called the Park, is more crowded with human bones than would be necessary for the burial ground of the garrison. The Rev. J. Watson, in his "History of the House of Warren," has gone into the history of the town at some length. In allusion to its antiquity and form of government, he observes, "After William the Conqueror thought himself firmly established upon the throne, he bestowed many provinces and counties of this realm on the great barons who assisted him. These strengthened the counties respectfully allotted to them, in the mode that seemed adapted to secure their possessions from the incursions of their neighbours. The Counties Palatine, as they have since been called, were judged to be in greater danger than the others, and greater attention was therefore paid to their defences. Thus, in the adjoining county palatine of Lancaster, Roger Pictavensis, the Earl, causes his whole jurisdiction to be surrounded with a chain of forts, some of which I shall mention, as their situations are immediately connected with the illustration of my subject. One of these forts was at *Widness*, where a baron was stationed to protect that part of Lancashire from the incursion of the Cheshire people; and as the jealousy was mutual, opposite to this, on the Cheshire side, was *Hallon Castle*, and Nigel, or rather William, son of Nigel, was fixed there with the same title, and stationed in such a manner as to guard the country from any surprise, either from Warrington, another Lancashire barony, or Runcorn Ferry. The next barony on the Lancashire side, above Warrington, was *Newton*, erected as well to strengthen the former as to oppose any passage out of Cheshire. The Earl of Chester made Hamo de Masei another of his Barons, and placed him opposite to the above at *Dunham*. Another barony of the Lancashire palatinate was Manchester, erected as a guard on one side, against any incursion from Stretford, and on the other against the military station which appears to have been, in very early times, at *Stockport*. Now, as all the above Lancashire Barons were made in the reign of the Conqueror by Roger Pictavensis, it seems to follow that the barony of Stockport is as old as the rest within the county of Chester; for why should every other Lancashire barony be guarded against, which lay opposite to Chester, and not that at Manchester? If such an opening into the county was permitted to remain unguarded, the other establishments must have been useless. When the castle at Stockport was first erected is uncertain; but the site on which it stood has the name of Castle yard to this day." It is highly probable that it stood on the site of a Roman fortress, and although entirely unnoticed in Domesday by its present name, Stockport, no doubt, was a place of considerable importance at a very early period. It is rational to suppose that Stockport was the head of a large parish antecedent to the Norman invasion; the whole district, indeed, in those days of difficulty and danger, may have been wasted, and in a measure destroyed, by the rapacity of the invaders. During the previous incursions of the Danes, Stockport, or its immediate neighbourhood, as has been before noted, was the scene of a signal overthrow of those marauders; and its situation, in a military point of view, was certainly one of the first importance. Stockport is a polling place, at the election of Members to represent North Cheshire. The Mayor is the Returning Officer.

The barony of Stockport belonged, soon after the conquest, to the De la Spencers, under whom it was held by the Stockports. Sir Robert de Stockport, about the year 1260, granted

to the burgesses a Charter, entitling them each to a homestead and an acre of land, on their rendering a shilling annually. They had also, at the same time, the grant of a market weekly, on Friday, and a fair yearly, on the feast of St. Winifred, to continue seven days. On the seizure of the estates of Hugh le Despenser, the partizan of Simon de Montfort, the barony of Stockport was taken by the Earl, under whom it was held by the lords of Stockport, in capite.

Much difficulty has prevailed with respect to the barons of Stockport, in ascertaining the family and origin of the "N——, Baron of Stockport, mentioned in the Vale Royal. Dugdale was of opinion that this "N" certainly was one of the barons of the Palatinate; but, adds he, "N" doth not stand for the last letter of his name, but is commonly used where the Christian name is unknown." The barons of Stockport have their only certain detail from Robert de Stockport. The second baron was Sir Robert de Stockport, Knight. Sir Richard de Stockport was the third baron. He left two coheireses, Joan and Maud; the former was married to Sir Nicholas de Eaton, and afterwards to Sir John Arden. This Sir John had Stockport, Poynton, and Widesford for his life, and part of the land in Etchells, by agreement, in consequence of which Nicholas, son of Sir Nicholas de Eaton, released to Sir John Hardern all his right to those manors, with the advowson of the churches, &c. Sir John Hardern then granted to Robert de Hampston, parson of Alderley and Richard de Manchester, his chaplain, the manor of Stockport, the manors of Wydesford and Etchells, but they soon after re-granted them, together with the advowson of the Church, to Robert de Eaton and his heirs, in whose family it continued till Sir Richard de Eaton, the seventh baron, who died without male issue, and the estates descended to John, son of Sir Edward de Warren, Knt. It is from this period the Warrens commenced their descent, subsequently represented by Lord Warren Bulkeley, and now by the Right Hon. George John Warren, Lord Vernon.

Lysons are of opinion, that Stockport was one of Hugh Lupus's baronies, and that the de Stockport family were the mesne lords of it; and further observe, "that there are documents extant, which show the extent of the baronies of Nantwich, Halton, Kinderton, and Malpas; but we find nothing of this kind relating to the barony of Stockport, and in records of the reign of Henry III., it is spoken of as a manor. It appears also that the proprietors of it, in the reign of Henry III., in the plea to a *quo warranto*, claimed only the privilege of punishing minor offenders by the pillory, tumbrel, and cucking-stool; whereas the barons, both spiritual and temporal, had the power of life and death."

Stockport was garrisoned for the Parliament during the civil wars, and was considered an important post. In the month of May, 1644, Prince Rupert appeared before it with his army; the garrison to the number of 3,000 horse and foot, drew out to oppose him, but were repulsed, and the town taken. The garrison seems to have made but little opposition, and the capture of the town to have been attended with but little bloodshed; the burial of one soldier only, "slain at the taking of Stockport, the 27th of May," is entered in the parish register. On May 10, 1645, Lord Fairfax's regiment of horse, commanded by Col. Spencer, removed from Macclesfield to the neighbourhood of Stockport, where they remained a week, and then marched into Yorkshire. On the 17th of August following, a number of Scots, 6,000 horse and 1,000 heavy dragoons, made Stockport their head-quarters, on their way from Congleton. On the 25th of the same month, Major Jackson, commanding eight troops of the Lancashire horse who had marched in the rear of the Scots, came from Yorkshire to Stockport. During the Scotch rebellion, the Pretender's army marched through Stockport; shortly after to prevent the retreat of the rebels, the bridge was blown up.

COTTON MANUFACTURES.—The extraordinary increase of this great branch of manufacture, during the last fifty years, is principally owing to the evolution of a series of brilliant inventions and improvements in the mechanism and general economy of factories. The cotton mills of Stockport are of noble proportions, and imposing aspect, and constitute no little item in the noticeable architecture of the town. The machinery introduced for the spinning of cotton was invented in Lancashire; but from a determination of the workmen to resist all improvements that had a tendency to supersede manual labour, Nottingham obtained the honour of having the first cotton mill erected in England. Until the latter part of the eighteenth century, the warp of cotton goods was of linen yarn, principally im-

ported from Germany or Ireland; and the weft was of cotton, which was carded by hand, and spun in the weaver's own family, by the distaff and spindle, which, after England began to export cotton goods, were soon found greatly insufficient to supply the increasing demands of the loom, though upwards of 50,000 spindles were daily in operation in Lancashire. At this juncture, an obscure mechanic, Thomas Highs, a reed maker, of Leigh, in Lancashire, made various attempts to procure the means of a more abundant supply of weft yarn; and, at length, after perseveringly submitting to a long course of the most contemptible of all imaginable things—the sneers and ignorance of prejudice, even from his *soi-disant* coadjutor, Kay, a clock maker, whom he employed to aid him in constructing wheels and other apparatus—he triumphantly accomplished the task of his destiny, by giving to the thankless world an instrument which—homely and humble as its name, the Spinning-Jenny, is—has proved a mine of gold to all but him by whom it was contrived. The inventor named it *Jenny* after his own daughter. Highs afterwards invented a double jenny, for which the merchants of Manchester honoured themselves no less than him, by presenting him with a premium of 200 guineas. But although the entire and undivided invention of the spinning jenny and water frame (of which Arkwright and Hargreaves have been called the originators) is claimed for Highs, by Mr. Guest, in his history of the cotton manufacture, and by others, it was Arkwright, himself an equally humble but an equally extraordinary individual, who had the undoubted merit of bringing it into practical and extensive utility, and, in short, of totally regenerating the cotton manufacture in this country.

The throstle, for the spinning of twist by rollers, was also an invention of Highs—but of this he was also superseded by Richard Arkwright, who had the address to possess himself of a model of High's machine, and from its further improvement—particularly by the addition of two movements for the laying on and taking off the cotton from the carding engine—was the foundation of Arkwright's future prosperity, and of the extension of the cotton trade. After Mr. Arkwright had constructed his machine, he had many difficulties to contend with, before he could derive any advantage from his inventions. Being in humble circumstances it was necessary to find some persons of property who were able and willing to encourage his project. With these he was so fortunate as to meet, and a patent was obtained for the exclusive use of the first three movements, *carding, sizing, and roving*, for the term of fourteen years. Another patent was afterwards granted for the operation of spinning during the same period. The specification was enrolled in April, 1776, which privilege he enjoyed till 1785, when his patent right was destroyed by a decision of the Court of King's Bench, after a very protracted litigation. Though Sir Richard Arkwright has been deprived of the honour of the original invention, and subjected to a want of fair dealing towards Highs, he possessed the merit of having perfected that which before had attained only an embryo state, and of having surmounted difficulties by the force of his own mind, which but few men could have triumphed over. His capacity for combination, if not of invention, was of the highest order, and his manufactories in Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire, in the infancy of the cotton trade, manifested the intelligence of a presiding genius. "In 1780, there were no less than twenty water frame factories, his property, or the proprietors of which had paid him largely for permission to use his machines. The populace, however, looked with an unfriendly eye upon them, and a mill of his at Chorley suffered the fate which attended many others—that of being demolished by a mob. But a more formidable enemy than this arose in the master manufacturers themselves, who organized a resolute opposition to his patent rights. An association was formed in Manchester, by whose instrumentality his patent for carding, drawing, and roving machines, was set aside in 1781, and his second patent in 1785. At the first trial, Highs was in attendance as a witness; the poor fellow passed his latter days in indigence, supported by the bounty of Mr. Peter Drinkwater, of Manchester. But Arkwright had gathered his harvest before this storm came; he became one of the richest commoners in England, and died at Cromford, in Derbyshire, in 1792.

The cotton factories are immense buildings raised to the height of six, seven, and eight stories, erected at an expense of many thousands of pounds, and are filled with machinery, costing as many more. The capital sunk in a single mill will often exceed £100,000. A

visit to one of the largest mills is a gratifying treat; the rooms are kept in the most perfect state of cleanliness, and the strictest order and regularity prevail. Every operation is performed by rule, and the subdivision of labour is carried out in the most minute manner. Several cotton factories, erected within the last fifteen years in Stockport, are noble structures and of immense magnitude; the mill erected by the late Alfred Orrell, Esq., and the one contiguous to it of Messrs. Kershaw, Lees, & Co., are magnificent structures, and proud monuments of the wealth, perseverance, and mercantile spirit of the "cotton lords." The aggregate amount of steam and water power employed in the cotton manufacture in the borough of Stockport amounts to more than 2,700 horses power. Thus Watt, with his mighty steam engine, put the key-stone on the factory system, and a new era sprang up in British manufactures; for there is probably not a country on the face of the globe into which the fruits of the industry of this and the adjoining county of Lancashire have not penetrated; and even the Indian, the African, the Tartar, and the Turk, are as familiar with the showy fabrics which are here woven, dyed, and printed, as the English people are themselves. For calico printing, bleaching, candle-wick making, and dyeing, there are extensive works in the town and its vicinity; also large corn mills, breweries, iron foundries, and many other minor manufactures, such as spindles, shuttles, and brushes, &c.; hats are also made to a considerable extent.

CHURCHES.

ST MARY'S, the Parish Church of Stockport, is built upon the site of the Old Church, supposed to have been erected early in the fourteenth century; it was taken down, except the chancel, in 1813, and consisted of nave, side aisles, chancel, and tower, and a private chapel, on the south side of the great chancel, belonging to the Vernons of Hurleston, Lords of Marple. The present structure stands in a commanding position, on the east side of the Market place, and is a noble pile, in the florid style of gothic architecture. The first stone of the new edifice was laid by Wilbraham Egerton, Esq., July 5, 1813, and the building was completed early in 1817, at the expense of £30,000. It consists of nave, chancel, and side aisles, and a lofty square embattled tower, surmounted by pinnacles, with a fine ring of eight bells. The pulpit and font are of oak, elaborately carved, and there is a powerful and fine-toned organ. The chancel of this Church, which for a many years had been in a state of great dilapidation, and presented a ruinous appearance, when contrasted with the more modern portion of this beautiful edifice, in the autumn of 1848, underwent a complete renovation, and not only gives grace and beauty to the whole, but presents one of the most highly finished and exquisitely wrought decorated chancels that has been erected for many years. The new chancel is of the same dimensions as its predecessor, and the great east window presents a display of architectural tracery, which, for exquisite gracefulness and elaborate chiselling, may rank among some of the finest specimens of the decorated workmanship of the 14th century. The interior of the chancel, which no doubt has often responded with the loud burst of "*Gloria in excelsis*," has likewise undergone a thorough renovation; and the whitewash plastering, so ill in keeping with the antiquity of the place, has been stripped from the walls, and the sombre appearance of the red sand stone gives an additional charm to the marble figures which grace the cenotaphs of departed excellence, that stud the walls of this hallowed resting place, and imparts, at the same time, to the whole of the interior, more of an ecclesiastical appearance. The parishioners are indebted for the restoration of this interesting portion of the Mother Church to the worthy rector, the cost of which has been £875. The Church contains many interesting memorials, which our limits will not allow us to notice, one of which, by Westmacott, remembers Sir George Warren. A female figure, in white marble, said to be a portrait of Lady Bulkeley, is represented as mourning over an urn; the inscription is as follows:—"To the memory of Sir George Warren, of Poynton, in this county, Knight of the most honourable order of Bath, lineally descended from the noble and ancient race of the Earls of ßWarren and Surrey, many years Representative in Parliament for the town of Lancaster, lord of the barony and manor of Stockport, &c. &c., whose remains lie interred in a family vault near this place: in whom the tender affections of the parent, the polished manners of the gentleman, the amiable qualities of the friend, and the social endearing attractions of the neighbour, were conspicuously united.

The living of St. Mary is a rectory, valued in the King's book at £70 6s. 8d., now returned at £1882, in the patronage of Lord Vernon; incumbent, Rev. Charles Kenrick Prescott.

St. PETER'S CHURCH, or rather Chapel, situated in St. Peter's square, is a brick building, remarkable only for the simplicity of its architecture. It was erected in 1768, at the sole expense of William Wright, Esq., who munificently endowed it with £120 per annum, arising from lands in Mottram St. Andrew. In 1838, two side galleries were added by private subscriptions, which will hold 220 hearers, the seats of which are free. The living is a perpetual curacy, which has been augmented with £200 benefaction, and £200 Queen Anne's bounty. There is also an endowment of £57 per annum, for reparations and other matters connected with the Church. Patron, Rev. Henry Wright; incumbent, Rev. R. H. Cresswell; officiating minister, Rev. John Meridith. The Church contains several neat marble tablets, one of which has this inscription—"To the memory of William Wright, Esq., of Mottram St. Andrew, in the county of Chester. As a magistrate he was upright, vigilant, and intrepid, but always tempered the severity of justice with the sweetness of a benevolent heart. Of virtue and learning, he was the pattern and example. In his private conduct, he was temperate and regular; severe in examining himself, but candid to others; tender and affectionate to his wife and family; and, to sum up all, the friend to human kind. To his pious munificence we owe this Chapel of St. Peter, erected and amply endowed by him in his lifetime, and also a provision for poor and deserted children of this town, where he resided many years. Nor was his bounty confined to the place of his abode, but largely extended, through the course of his life, to every useful institution and proper object of compassion. Supported by a lively faith in Christ, and an entire resignation to the will of God, after a life of 73 years, embittered with pain and trouble, he was rewarded with an easy death, on the 3rd of December, 1770. To shew to after times the bright example of Christian virtue, and as a small testimony of his gratitude to the memory of his kind relation, this monument is erected by the Rev. Henry Offley Wright." On the north side of the altar is a tablet—"To the memory of the Rev. Thomas Bentham. He was born within the precincts of the Cathedral, and educated at St. John's College, Cambridge. In the year 1737, he succeeded to the vicarage of Aberford, in the county of York, where his laborious discharge of all parochial duties for thirty years, recommended him to the pious founder of this Chapel, to which he was presented, upon its consecration. Anxious to promote the glory of God and the good of [man-kind, he devoted his time and talents to the duties of his sacred office. In the public discharge of his ministry, he was watchful, zealous, and prudent; in the intercourse of private life, benevolent, humble, pious; recommending what he taught by the uniform tenor of his example. He died May 2nd, 1790, in the 76th year of his age." The parsonage is a good brick residence, on the south west side of the Church, now unoccupied.

St. THOMAS' CHURCH is a handsome structure, on the east side of Wellington road South. The spacious pile was commenced building in September, 1822, and finished in 1825, at an expense of upwards of £16,000, defrayed by the Parliamentary Commissioners. It is a noble pile of free stone, in the Grecian style of architecture, with a tower, surmounted by a cupola. The principal entrance is at the east end, by a handsome portico of six lofty Ionic pillars. It contains 2,400 sittings, of which 1000 are free; there are galleries on each side and at the west end, and a fine toned organ has been erected at a cost of £500. The whole has a very chaste and elegant appearance. The living is a perpetual curacy, endowed with £1,130 10s. 10d. parliamentary grant; the patronage is vested in Lord Vernon; incumbent, Rev. Joseph Taylor, M.A. On the next avoidance of the rectory of Stockport, the incumbent of this church will enjoy the tithes of Stockport, Stockport Etchells, and Bramall. A neat tablet remembers the Rev. Martin Gilpin, the first incumbent of this church, who died in 1839, at Douglas, in the Isle of Man, where he was interred. The handsome font of freestone, beautifully carved, has been added within the last few years; the cost of it was £12.

CHRIST CHURCH, an elegant edifice of freestone, stands in a conspicuous situation on the east side of Wellington-street North, in Heaton Norris; it is a cruciform structure, in the early English style, surmounted by a lofty and well-proportioned spire, 180 feet high, which is furnished with a clock having three dials. The internal arrangements have a very

chaste and neat appearance, and there is accommodation for 1,230 worshippers; about 600 of the sittings are free. The church was built in 1846, at a cost of £6,000, raised by subscriptions, and grants from the Church Building Societies. Wilbraham Egerton, Esq., of Tatton Park, gave the munificent sum of £1,200 towards the building fund, £1,000 towards the endowment, and the site. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Bishop of Manchester, and enjoyed by the Rev. Charles Babington Jeaffreson, M.A.

CHAPELS.

The **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHAPEL**, TIVOT DALE, is by far the most imposing place of worship in connection with the Non-conformists in the town of Stockport. It is a noble edifice, in the Grecian style, erected in 1824, at a cost of £14,000; it is built of brick, and fronted with white freestone, and approached by a lofty portico, supported by massive pillars of the Ionic order. The characteristics of the interior are simplicity and elegance; it contains a fine organ, and has accommodation for 2,500 worshippers; a spacious cemetery adjoins.

The **OLD WESLEYAN CHAPEL**, Hillgate, is a plain brick building, neatly fitted up with galleries all round, and provided with a good organ. There are seats in this chapel for about 1,000 persons.

The **WESLEYAN CHAPEL**, Edgeley, is a small fabric which will hold 300 persons; it was erected in 1817, and is surrounded by a spacious burial-ground. On the opposite side of the street is a day and Sunday school, built in 1824, in connection with the Methodists.

The **WESLEYAN CHAPEL**, BRUNSWICK, situate in Portwood, is a beautiful structure in the early English style, opened for Divine worship in the spring of 1849. The architect of this place of worship merits the tribute of approbation which originality deserves. He has here revelled in a series of combinations of the most exquisite gracefulness (new, at all events, to us) in chapel architecture. The pitch of the roof is fine and sharp; the base is finished by an elaborate scroll of freestone; the windows are beautifully foliated, and the whole has a very chaste and elegant appearance. The cost of the edifice, with the site, was upwards of £3,500.

The **WESLEYANS** are building another chapel at Dean Row, the foundation stone of which was laid in May, 1849.

The **INDEPENDENT CHAPEL** (Hanover) is situated on the New road, Lancashire hill, Heaton Norris; it is a handsome castellated structure of brick, stuccoed, with a tower ornamented with four pinnacles; the interior has a very beautiful appearance; the east window is ornamented with stained glass, in which are representations of Faith, Hope, and Charity; from the centre of the ceiling hangs a magnificent chandelier. The chapel contains a good organ. The Rev. Nathaniel K. Pugsley is the minister.

The **INDEPENDENT CHAPEL**, (*Tabernacle*), situate in Middle hill gate, is a plain brick building, rebuilt in 1807 to accommodate 700 worshippers. The original structure was erected in 1705. It is provided with neat galleries, and a marble tablet remembers the Rev. Solomon Ashton who was pastor of the church for 36 years, and who died in 1836; it contains a small organ, and in front of the chapel is a burial ground. The Rev. John Thornton is the pastor.

The **INDEPENDENT CHAPEL**, Orchard street, Waterloo road, a brick building with a belfry is situated on a considerable elevation, and was built about the year 1790; it is provided with galleries all round, and will hold 650 hearers. The Rev. Absalom Clark is the minister. This sect of non-conformists have a small place of worship in Moseley street, Edgeley, which is also used as a school room. The old Unitarian Chapel situate at the back of High street, is now rented by the Independents, it is small brick structure, and one of the oldest places of worship in connexion with the non-conformists in the town of Stockport. A small burial ground is attached.

The **CATHOLIC CHAPEL**, Edgeley, was opened for divine service in 1801; it is a brick fabric fronted with free stone, having a tower surmounted by a dome. The altar is ornamented with scroll work, and in lieu of that chastened and refined workmanship which many of the catholic chapels display in their internal decorations, the painter has here blended a profusion of the most dazzling colours ornamented with gilt. The chapel will

hold 1050 persons, and is provided with an organ, on the side walls are two neat tablets for two of the priests who have officiated at this chapel. The Rev. Randolph Frith and Rev. Peter Baron are the priests.

The UNITARIAN CHURCH, St. Peter's Gate, a neat gothic edifice was built in 1841, at a cost of £3,000. The structure is of free stone with hewn quoins and cornices, and is supported with buttresses, and ornamented with two pinnacles. The internal arrangements have a very chaste appearance, and the pulpit is provided with a sounding board. It is calculated to hold 500 worshippers. The organ, a fine toned instrument, was the gift of James Coppock, Esq. of London. The British school is taught underneath the church.

The PARTICULAR BAPTIST CHAPEL (*Providence*), Heaton lane, a small brick fabric, built in 1817, will hold 400 persons; it was formerly surrounded by a burial-ground, which is now built upon. This chapel was forfeited to the landowner in consequence of the congregation neglecting to pay the ground rent. It is now rented by the present pastor, the Rev. Charles Emile de Valmont. The seats are all free, and no collections are made in this chapel for any object whatever.

The BAPTIST CHAPEL (*Sion*) Greek street, is a plain brick building, stuccoed, erected in 1840, at a cost of about £1,300; it will hold about 800 hearers. The congregation is under the pastoral care of the Rev. John Russell. The General Baptists occupy a large room in Hillgate Hall, for Divine worship.

MOUNT TABOR CHAPEL belongs to the Wesleyan New Connection, and is situated in London square; it is a neat brick edifice, erected in 1798, which will accommodate 700 worshippers; it is provided with galleries, and an organ, and has a burial-ground attached. This Society have a chapel situated in Great Portland street, erected in 1848; it is a plain brick building, with about 800 sittings.

The INDEPENDENT METHODISTS have a small chapel in Ratcliffe street, built in 1832.

The METHODIST ASSOCIATION CHAPEL, Wellington road South, is a small brick fabric, built in 1836.

The FRIENDS' MEETING HOUSE, a small structure in Middle Hillgate, has a burial-ground attached.

The CHRISTIAN SOCIETY have preaching rooms in George-street, Bridgefield, and Portwood.

The LATTER DAY SAINTS meet for worship in a room at the top of Wellington steps, High street.

The PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHAPEL, Duke street, is a neat brick building, erected in 1827.

SCHOOLS.

The FREE GRAMMAR SCHOOL was founded by Sir Edmund Shaa, goldsmith and alderman of London in 1487, and endowed with £10 per annum. The following is a correct copy of the clause in Sir Edmund Shaa's will relating to the school. "And I woll that the other honest preest, (the first mentioned was to officiate at Woodhead chapel) be a discrete man, and conning in gramer, and be able of connyng to teche gramer; and I woll that he sing hisse masse, and say his other divyne service in the parishe of Stopforde, in the said countye, of Chester, at souch an aulter there, as can be thought convenient for hym, and to pray spectally for my soule, and the soules &c. And I woll that the same connyng preest kepe a gramer-school, contynually in the said towne of Stopforde as long as he shall contynewe there in the said service. And that he freely, without any wages or salarie, asking or taking of any parson, except only my salarie hereunder specified, shall teche al manor of persons' children, and other that woll come to him to lerne, as well of the said towne of Stopforde, as of other townes thereabout, the science of gramer as ferre as lieth in hym for to do, unto the time that they be convenable instruct in gramer by him, after their capaciteys that God woll geve them. And I woll that the same connyng preest, with all his scholers with hym that he shall have for the time, shall, two dayes in every weke, as long as he shall abyde in that service ther, that is to wite Wedynysday and Fryduy, come into the said church of Stopforde, unto the grave ther, where the bodies of my fader and my moder lyen buried, and ther say togiders the psalm of *De Profundis*, with the versicles and collets therto

accustomyed after Salisbury use; and pray especially for my soule, and the soules of my fader, and my moder, and for all Christian soules. And I woll that the same preest teachinge gramer ther, shall have for his salarye yearely, as long as he abide in that service there £10. I woll that the same feliship shall haue for evermore the presentement, nominacion, and admyssion of the said two preestes of the said two services, and the removing and putting out of them, and admytting of other into the same services, for causes reasonable, as often as the case so shall require." In another clause of his will he directs his executors "to buy as moach Walshe fryse, half white and half black, as may and thereof do make, at my coste, 200 party-gownes for the poore of Stopforde, Chedle Mottram," and some neighbouring parishes in Lancashire there specified. To Stopforde Church he gives as good a suit of vestments of blue velvet as may be bought with the summe of 40 marks." He directs "16 rings of fyne gold, to be graven with the well of pitie, the well of mercie, and the well of everlasting life," and to be given to his friends.

The GRAMMAR SCHOOL is an ornamental building situate in Wellington road South, the first stone of which was laid by the Wardens of the Goldsmiths' Company, September 8th, 1831; the style of architecture is that of the time of Edward VIII., and the total cost of schools, with residences for the teachers, has been upwards of £7,500. The above expense includes the new wing added in 1848, and the ushers' residence, &c., with about 2,000 yards of land added to the play-ground, and shrubberies, &c. The number of scholars are limited to 150, who must be the sons of persons residing in Stockport or its neighbourhood. Fifty scholars are instructed free of expense; the rest pay £2 2s. per quarter, which is paid into the funds of the Goldsmiths' Company, and they pay the respective salaries of the head master and the ushers. The scholars are taught the usual branches of a liberal education, and the whole is very efficiently conducted. Applications are numerous, and frequently beyond the number to which the school is limited. A valuable library of about 800 volumes has been provided for the pupils; head master, Rev. William Gurney, B.A. The ancient Grammar School stood opposite to the school pump in Chestergate.

The NATIONAL SCHOOL is a noble pile of brick, situated on elevated ground in Wellington road South; it is approached by a flight of steps, and over the entrance hall, which is faced with freestone, is a committee-room; the rest of the building forms two spacious school-rooms, the lower one used for the boys measuring 104 feet by 40 feet, and 15 feet high; the upper room is of the same dimensions, with the exception of being 11 feet higher. Each room is provided with an organ, and the girls' room has galleries for the accommodation of the Sunday scholars. The school was erected in 1826 at a cost of £6,177 7s. About 300 boys and 200 girls attend. A neat cottage for the residence of the master has been built near the southern extremity of the school premises.

The NATIONAL SCHOOL, St. Thomas's, is a spacious brick building, measuring 90 feet by 40 feet, situated on the north side of St. Thomas's Churchyard, built at a cost of £2,000. Lady Vernon gave the site and £500, and the National Society £900; the rest was raised by subscriptions. About 300 children attend.

ST. PETER'S NATIONAL SCHOOL, a neat brick building on the north side of St. Peter's Church, was erected in 1844; it is now used exclusively for the instruction of infants; about 70 children attend.

The BRITISH SCHOOL, a neat brick structure, pleasantly situated in Wellington road South, consists of a central room, occupied by the boys, with a room on each side; that on the north being occupied by the girls, and the one on the opposite side is used as a classroom. It was opened in 1844, and will accommodate 200 boys and 100 girls. The site was given by Lord Vernon, and the cost of the building was about £1,000, of which £250 was granted by the Privy Council on Education.

The BRITISH SCHOOL, St. Peter's gate, is taught in a spacious, and convenient room under the Unitarian chapel, extending the whole length of the building, and is numerously attended.

The Wesleyan Day and Sunday School at the extremity of Newbridge Lane, is a plain brick building also used for divine service. The Wesleyans have also a Day and Sunday School in Edgeley. The Primitive Methodists have a Sunday School in Lord street.

THE STOCKPORT SUNDAY SCHOOL, situated near the summit of a bold acclivity between London place and Duke street, is a noble structure of brick four stories high, erected in 1805, at a cost of £9,000. To which two wings were added in 1835, at an expense of 3,000, and auxiliary schools have also been built at Brinksway, Heaton Mersey, Lancashire Hill, and Heaviley, making a total outlay of upwards of £20,000 in the erection of Sunday schools, devoted in perpetuity to the education and religious instruction of the children of the labouring poor of the town of Stockport, and the neighbourhood. The origin of the Stockport Sunday School is to be traced as far back as the year 1784. It was founded by a few religiously active and benevolent men of different denominations, who lamented the prevalent ignorance of the town and who overlooked the interest of party in the earnestness and comprehensiveness of their desire to promote the knowledge and happiness of their fellow men. The schools were held at first in cottages, then an empty factory was taken, and step by step the cause advanced, until the magnificent building was raised, in which, in 1806 the first of the annual sermons that excite so much interest in the town and neighbourhood, was preached by the Rev. Richard Powell, rector of Wibsey. Private contributions were from the first obtained from all sects and parties, and collections were made for a time in the churches and dissenting places of worship in aid of the common and public interests of education. Although the selfishness of sectarianism soon began to display itself, and the collections to which we have referred were discontinued, yet the basis of the Sunday School system remained firm and secure, and to the present day the school is recognized as a towns institution, and its teachers belong to all the denominations of Stockport, who in the spirit of harmony, labour together for the common object of giving a sound scriptural education to the rising generation. Church and chapel schools have been formed and multiplied, but the old institution continues to be as popular and useful as ever, and there are now 5,188 children receiving education from upwards of 450 voluntary teachers of both sexes; of the total number of scholars 3,868 are taught in the Stockport School 209 at Brinksway, 319 at Heaton Mersey, 491 at Lancashire Hill, and 301 in the Heaviley branch School. The entire number of scholars admitted since the commencement of the school up to June 1848 are stated to be 60,991, and the number of teachers in the same period have been 3,038. The original trustees are now reduced by death from forty-two, to four, and it is somewhat singular that these four, whose united ages are not much under 320 years, are very fair representatives of the liberal and harmonious principles on which it was founded, one being a Churchman, another a Non-conformist, the third a Methodist, and the fourth, more a lover of truth and piety and all good works more than of the mere forms of any party. There are 83 rooms in the large school at Stockport, independent of the magnificent lecture room which occupies the third story of the building, and will hold an immense concourse of people. It is furnished with a fine organ, the gift of Robert Parker, Esq., in 1811; here the annual sermon is preached, the collection, which on one occasion amounted to the munificent sum of £500. In the year 1848 there were 948 copies of the scriptures sold to the scholars, and the sum of £40 18s. 7d. was received for half-penny tracts. The Bible is the only class book. The libraries belonging the institution contain 3279 volumes.

THE INFIRMARY occupies a pleasant and healthy situation in Wellington road South. It is a handsome structure of brick, fronted with free stone, one hundred feet in length; and the principal entrance consists of a portico, supported by four fluted Doric columns. The fever wards are entirely separated from every other part of the building. The first stone of this Samaritan institution was laid on June 8th, 1832, and the cost of the structure was upwards of £5,300 among those who munificently contributed towards the expense of the erection, are the Right Hon. Frances Maria Warren; Lady Vernon, £250; the proceeds of a ladies' bazaar produced £873; William Andrew, Esq., gave £100; Wilbraham Egerton, Esq., £150; James Heald, Esq., £200; the Misses Heald, £250; Joseph Lane, Esq., £100; James Leech, Esq., £100; Thomas Marsland, Esq., £150; Miss Orford, £100; Francis Philips, Esq., £200; William Thornhill, Esq., £100; and others. The institution has accommodation for 50 in-patients. Upwards of 3,000 out-patients have been admitted on the books since the building was completed. On the 25th of March, 1848, there were 187

out-patients and 30 in-patients remaining on the books; and the total income for the year ending at the above date, was £1361 4s. 11d., which was raised by subscriptions and donations, &c. *Patron*, the Right Hon. Lord Vernon; *president*, Wilbraham Egerton, Esq.; *treasurer*, James Heald, Esq., M.P.; *deputy treasurer*, James Leech; *physicians*, George Turner, M.D., and James Ashton, M.D.; *consulting surgeons*, Joseph Bellott and Richard Flint; *visiting surgeons*, John Medd, George Downes, John Rayner, and William Henry Bellott; *assistant surgeons*, John Pearson, George Young, and Thomas Massey; *house surgeon*, William R. Raby. The Stockport Dispensary, originally established in 1792, to which fever wards were added in 1803, was merged in the General Infirmary on its opening for the reception of patients, in 1833.

The LYCEUM, Wellington street, is a spacious building, erected in 1841, at a cost of £2,000 raised in shares of £1 each. The large upper room will hold about 1200 persons, and is provided with an orchestra at the west end. Lectures, concerts, and public meetings are occasionally held in this room. The lower compartments of the building is divided into rooms used as evening schools.

The MECHANICS INSTITUTION, established in 1834, is under the management of a president, vice-president, and a committee of honorary and ordinary members. The Theatre, situated in Nelson street, was taken for the general objects of the Institution; the floor of the pit has been covered over, and is now used as a lecture room having accommodation for about 1,000 persons. There are classes for reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, drawing, elocution, french, chemical and essay and discussion classes. It is gratifying to observe that some of the young persons who have no other means of education, to improve their minds, and advance their position, have shewn a degree of attention bordering on enthusiasm, in the prosecution of their studies. There are upwards of 500 members; the library in connexion with the institution contains upwards of 3,000 volumes and a news room has been established, which is furnished with the principal daily and weekly papers, and the most popular periodicals of the day. James Moles is the librarian.

The SAVINGS BANK was originally established in 1824, and held in certain premises in the Under Bank. In 1843 the Bank was removed to the present premises in Hillgate, upon which about £1,500 was expended. The capital stock of the bank on the 20th of November, 1847, amounted to £126,760 17s. 6d., and the total number of depositors were 2,645, besides 122 Friendly Societies; of the number of depositors there were 1,320 whose respective balances did not exceed £20; 761 not exceeding £50; 370 not exceeding £100; 122 were above that sum and not exceeding £150; 53 not exceeding £200; and 19 depositors whose balances exceed £200. *Patron*—Right Hon. George John Warren Lord Vernon; *President*—Wilbraham Egerton, Esq.; *Actuary*—Walter Vaughan.

The CONSERVATIVE NEWS ROOM, Turner's buildings, has been established about twenty years. It is furnished with the leading journals of the London and provincial press, and is supported by annual subscriptions of 21s. per annum. Mr. G. M. Fernes is the honorary secretary. In the same premises is the Subscription Billiard Room.

The Stockport Tradesmen and Operative and Conservative Association News-Room and Library was established in 1835; it is furnished with the London and provincial papers, and other periodicals, and is held in Astley's yard, near the steps leading from Under-bank to the Market-place.

The STOCKPORT CEMETERY, situated near the entrance of Wellington road south, has been formed about 10 years. It was established by a company of shareholders with a capital stock of £12,000, raised in £10 shares; about £5,000 was laid out in the purchase of the site, and £3,000 in planting and ornamenting the ground, and preparing the vaults &c. A very neat structure of brick, fronted with free stone, in the Grecian style of architecture, stands near the entrance, in which the burial service is read. The proprietors, at considerable expense have beautified the grounds with flowers and shrubs, and made it infinitely preferable to the over crowded grave-yards which are so often seen in populous towns, where the abode of the dead is often openly violated, and its deposits sacrilegiously disturbed and ejected.

The WATERWORKS, situate at the Park Mills, King street East, near the junction of the Tame with the Mersey, were established in 1825, by Peter Marsland, Esq. The water of

partly obtained from Artesian springs and partly from the river Mersey. A water-wheel is 78 horse-power, and a steam-engine of 80 horse power, in conjunction, work a set of three double-acting pumps, eight inches in diameter, and raise the water from four Artesian wells, which are 140 yards deep. The water is then conveyed to the reservoir at Woodbank, where it is all double filtered before supplied to the town. This reservoir covers 1a. On. 23p. of land, and is 140 feet above the level of the Park Mills, the water being chiefly used for the supply of the higher parts of the town. There is also a reservoir, covering about seven acres, near to Portwood, the water of which is obtained from the Mersey, at a bend of the river several miles from Stockport, whence it is conveyed by tunnels into the reservoir. The water supplied to the inhabitants is clear and good, and abundant in quantity, and the company have the means of furnishing an additional supply almost to an unlimited extent. Messrs. Marslands are the proprietors of the works. The Mersey and the Tame flow in a channel of red sandstone, which rises from five to ten yards, and in some places more, above the level of the river; wells, therefore, sunk by the inhabitants, and situated at a low level, where the water filtrates through the red sandstone, are well supplied with good water; but in all the districts of the town above that level, with few exceptions, good water is difficult to procure, the water above that level being merely surface or top water.

The Gas Works were established in 1825, by a company of shareholders, with a capital stock of upwards of £21,000 raised in £50 shares, since which, an additional sum of £15,000 has been expended in the extension of the works, for supplying gas commensurate with the wants of this rapidly increasing manufacturing district. The works are situate in Millgate, where four capacious gasometers have been erected. There are also three gasometers in Heaton lane, and one in George street. A charge of 6s. per 1000 cubic feet is made to the consumer. The works were purchased by the Corporation in 1838.

The BARRACKS, in Hall street, are situated about half a mile E. by S. from the Church, and were erected in 1820-1, at a cost of £4,976 several alterations and additions were made in the year 1830, and there is now accommodation for 166 men and 9 officers. The barracks form a spacious quadrangle, circumscribed by a wall ten feet high. On the east side is a spacious brick building, three stories high, for the accommodation of the officers and privates, and also used as a canteen. On the south is the barrack serjeants and barrack officers' stores, and on the north, is the magazine, prison, armoury, and guardhouse. The hospital is situated at the north west corner, and will hold 32 patients. Mr. Samuel Ford Basleigh is the barrack master.

The COURT HOUSE is a brick building, with stone facings, situate in Vernon street, and erected about 20 years ago. It contains a commodious hall for the trial of prisoners, magistrates' room, superintendent's room, and other offices. The borough lock-ups are situate in the basement of the Court Hall, and consists of day-rooms, and five cells. Prisoners on committal are sent to Chester and Knutsford, except the prisoners taken in the part of the borough comprised in Lancashire, who are committed to Salford or Kirkdale. Petty Sessions are held on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday. The Police force consists of a superintendent, sergeant, and nine officers. Mr. John Hall is the superintendent.

THE COUNTY COURT, for the recovery of debts not exceeding £20. is held at the Court House every alternate Friday. The Court embraces the townships of Stockport, Brinnington, Bramall, Cheadle Bulkeley, Cheadle Moseley, Stockport Etchells, Handforth-cum-Bosden, Marple, Norbury, Offerton, Romiley, and Torkington in Cheshire; and Heaton, Norris, and Reddish in Lancashire: Joseph St. John Yates, Esq., Judge; Henry Coppock, Esq., Clerk; Thomas Beswick, High Bailiff.

COUNTY NEW BAILEY LOCK-UP is a brick building in Mill lane, provided with twelve cells; Mr. George Oswald Andrews is the Special High Constable, and there are six Police Officers.

THE UNION HOUSE, situated on Shaw Heath, is a spacious brick structure erected in 1841, for the accommodation of 690 inmates, the average number is about 400. The total cost of the building was £13,470 12s. 10½d., of which £9,627 was expended in the building; £659 paid for fixtures; and £171 for furniture; £230 for the warming and drying apparatus; £160 for clock and bell; and the sum of £2,503 was expended in incidentals.

The arrangement of the building comprises several quadrangles, in which are workshops, stores, washhouses, hospital, lunatic wards, and every convenience admirably adapted for the comfort, cleanliness, and convenience of the inmates. The Union comprises an area of 26,883 acres, and 85,634 souls, and contains the following townships:—Stockport, Brinnington, Heaton Norris, Reddish, Handforth-cum-Bosden, Bramall, Cheadle Bulkeley, Cheadle Moseley, Stockport Etchells, Norbury, Offerton, Torkington, Bredbury, Hyde, Marple, Romiley, and Werneth. *Clerk and Superintendent Registrar*, Henry Coppock, Esq.; *Deputy Clerk and Registrar*, James Oakes. *Medical Officers*, Joseph Blackshaw, William Raynor, Frederick Tinker, Alexander A. Thomson, and Isaac Chubb. *Relieving Officers*, William Bottom, Daniel Chalton, and John Watson. *Master and Matron*, Thomas and Elizabeth Barrington. *Schoolmaster*, George Burgess. There are 22 Guardians who meet every Monday morning at ten o'clock, in the Board Room.

BRIDGES.—In addition to the Wellington Road Bridge already noticed, the LANCASHIRE BRIDGE crosses the Mersey from Bridge Street to Lancashire Hill, in Heaton Norris, it consists of one arch built high above the river to avoid the inconvenience caused by sudden and violent swellings of the stream, and has its abutments built on the red sand stone rock, which here lines the banks of the river.

VERNON BRIDGE was erected by subscriptions in 1820, it is a structure of wood for the convenience of foot passengers, and crosses the Mersey from the Union Tavern Yard into Heaton lane.

PORTWOOD BRIDGE is a substantial structure which crosses the Mersey at the foot of King street East. About fifty yards below the bridge the river Tame forms a junction with the Mersey. A dilapidated wood bridge crosses the Mersey in a line with Warren street, into Portwood. The Bridge across the Mersey from Brinksway to Travis street in Heaton Norris, was rebuilt in 1847.

The Market place embraces an area 3,630 yards within the kirbstones; but its site being the summit of a hill, is somewhat difficult of access. The Market is held on Friday, when the town presents a bustling scene, and considerable quantities of oatmeal, corn cheese, and potatoes are sold. Several ranges of stalls are usually placed for the exhibition of butchers meat. The shambles and market, built in Hillgate, was never much frequented, and is now altogether disused. The cattle and swine market, also held on Friday on a plot of ground near the Neptune Inn, is well attended. FAIRS are held on March 1st, March 25th, May 1st, and October 23rd. The Stockport Railway Station is situated behind the Infirmary, Wellington road South; there is also a Station at Heaton Norris, the latter of which is the general depot for goods conveyed by the Railway for Stockport and Heaton Norris.

There are in Stockport a number of *Benefit Societies*, the members of which pay small monthly contributions to their respective funds, from which they are relieved in case of sickness, infirmity, and superannuation; and from which the relatives or friends of deceased members receive sums varying from £7 to £10 to provide for their decent interment, &c. Among these fraternities are several secret orders, viz., *Lodges of Freemasons, Ancient Druids, Odd Fellows, Foresters, Shepherds, &c.*, whose splendid "regalia" gives an imposing effect to all public processions. The Ancient and Noble Order of United Odd Fellows have four Lodges in Stockport.

HEATON NORRIS forms a large and handsome suburb to the town of Stockport, from which it is divided by the river Mersey, and so intimately connected with that town in trade, that it may be said to form a part of it. It is a township and chapelry in the parish of Manchester and County of Lancaster, intersected by the Manchester and Birmingham Railway. And the New Wellington road crosses the chapelry. The Ashton, Manchester, and Oldham, Canal terminates here at Lancashire hill, a steep acclivity above the Mersey. *Christ Church*, an elegant structure on the Wellington road; a handsome *Dissenters' Chapel*, and the noble edifice *Tiviot Dale Chapel*, which belongs to the Wesleyans, are all in Heaton Norris. These, and other places of worship, will be found more particularly noticed with Stockport. The names of the inhabitants will be found incorporated with the Stockport Directory, in the municipal borough, of which the inhabitants of Heaton Norris are comprised. The township in 1801, contained 3,768 inhabitants; in 1831, 11,238; and in 1841, they had increased

to 14,629 souls. The inhabitants are chiefly employed in manufactures. The cotton trade is very extensively carried on here.

CHARITIES.

WARREN'S ALMSHOUSES.—*Edward Warren, Esq.*, by will January 26, 1683, bequeathed to the six poor old men which he had placed in the six rooms, built by him on the side of the churchyard of Stockport, a yearly sum of 20s. to each inmate, and he directed that his heirs for ever should keep the buildings in good repair; and in case his heirs should neglect for two months, after the death of the inhabitants of the almshouses, to place another in his room, the parson of Stockport might appoint a poor man to the same. The almshouses consists of six rooms under one roof, on the north side of the churchyard, which are kept in repair at the expense of Lord Vernon. The land from which the £6 per annum is charged is called Hemphaw gate, and is the property of Lord Vernon, whose agent usually appoints the inmates.

Viscountess Warren Bulkeley, by will 10th March, 1823, bequeathed to the archdeacon of Chester and the rector of Stockport £1200 to be invested on Government security, and to pay the dividends equally among the six poor persons who should for the time being inhabit the six almshouses, situate near the Old Churchyard, Stockport, which were built and endowed by her great grandfather, John Warren, Esq., of Poynton.

Unknown Donors.—Several sums of money, left for the support of the Free School, at Stockport, and other gifts, bestowed for the benefit of the most necessitous poor of the town, which had been put forth at interest, and produced £7 10s. per annum, in 1705, was transferred into the hands of the overseers, and it seems that the sum of £7 10s. was formerly paid by the overseers to the schoolmaster, but there is reason to believe that a late master of the school received the principal money, and agreed to give security for it; this, however, was never done, and he died insolvent; the money is therefore lost.

Alexander Lowe, by will 1607, gave the under room of the house wherein the school was then kept, for the use of the school, to be kept there for ever. He also bequeathed £50 for the benefit of the schoolmaster, £10 towards the reparation of the Church steeple, and £20 to be employed for the use of the poor. Nothing certain is known respecting this charity, but there seems some reason to believe that it is part of the above-mentioned sums, which came into the hands of the schoolmaster.

Mary Haywood, in 1690, gave £20 to the poor; *Dorothy Wilkinson*, in 1769, £30; and *John Sydebotham*, in 1736, £10. The benefaction table agrees with the Parliamentary return as to the amount of the two first legacies, but gives £60 as the amount of the Sydebothams.

The Churchwardens hold themselves answerable for £60, which is called Sydebotham's charity, but know nothing of the other two. No reasonable doubt can be entertained that the £60 held by the Churchwardens is the aggregate of the three charities. The mistake on the benefaction table, as to the amount, was probably occasioned by the whole having been called by that name. The £60 is secured on the Stockport and Ashton turnpike road, and the interest is distributed with the sacrament money.

By indenture 14th February, 1711, *Edward Warren, Esq.*, lord of the manor of Stockport, for the ease of the inhabitants in payment of assessments to the poor, also for assisting the Mayor in the annual charge of his office, and for the encouragement of the schoolmaster, conveyed for ever so much of the waste grounds upon Stockport moor, Shaw Heath, and Heap Rydeings, as would yield the clear yearly rent of three score pounds, or thereabouts, and directed one-sixth of the annual rents to be paid to the Mayor, one-sixth to the schoolmaster, and four sixths to the overseers of the poor, in aid of the payment of their rates to the poor. The property so granted is now divided into various small plots, on some of which cottages are standing, and the amount of the yearly rents is £69 10s., one-sixth of which, £11 11s. 8d. is paid to the schoolmaster, and a like sum to the mayor, and the rest is paid in aid of the poor's rates.

John Harden, by will 1738, gave to the poor of Stockport or Bradbury, not receiving relief, £300, which is secured on mortgage on property in Charlesworth and in Stockport. The interest has been periodically applied for the benefit of the poor of Stockport, in times of unusual distress, after a town's meeting has been held to consider the best means of appro-

priation. The periods of division have occurred when there have been sums of £50, £100, or £200 in hand.

Humphrey Warren, in 1744, bequeathed £100, and directed a yearly sum of 20s. to be paid to the curate, 10s. to the clerk, 5s. to the inmates of the six almshouses, and 40s. to the poor of Stockport. The amount is secured on the Stockport and Ashton turnpike road, for which 5 per cent. is paid yearly; the several gifts are paid to the respective parties, and the rest is added to the sacrament money.

William Wright, by will 1770, bequeathed £800 to the rector and church wardens in trust, to invest the same in some of the public funds, and apply the annual produce in binding four poor children born in the township of Stockport apprentice to husbandry, gardening or such other trade as the trustees shall think fit. This sum of £800 is now in the hands of Lord Vernon, who pays £25 a year for the money. The rector and churchwardens put at least four children yearly apprentice, with whom premiums of £6 15s each are paid. The Parliamentary returns state that Elias Agecroft, in 1771, gave £500 to the poor which was vested in John Collier. One of Collier's executors in his evidence speaks of Collier having a legacy in his hands for buying books for the poor, and that Collier had told him that he was in the habit of buying Bibles and Testaments with the money and distributing them to the schools and the poor, and that he had disposed of both principal and interest in that way. It appears that Agecroft had been a sort of librarian to Mr Bradshaw, of Marple Hall, and it is understood that he left his books to the Bredbury School so long as there should be a classical master there, and if there should be no classical master there then to be removed to Marple School, on the same condition. The books were removed to Marple pursuant to the will a great many years ago, and placed in the chamber over the school room. Some of the books were found to be of a very licentious and indecent character. In consequence of this, John Isherwood Esq. of Marple Hall had the books removed to his residence, where they still remain: It was recommended that such of the books as were not of an immoral character should be returned to the school.

Thomas Thornily, in 1775, conveyed three messuages in Upper Hillgate in trust, and directed the clear rents of the messuages to be expended in bread and distributed every Sunday in the year after divine service. The premises subsequently fell to decay, and the poor were deprived of their usual donations of bread; when the trustees agreed to sell the premises subject to a clear yearly rent charge of £6 10s per annum. This annuity is expended in bread for the poor.

Viscountess *Warren Bulkely*, by will dated 10th of March, 1823, gave to the persons who at her decease, should respectively be archdeacon of Chester and rector of Stockport £1,000, on trust, to place out the same in Government securities, and apply the dividends for the benefit of the poor of the township of Stockport. And she gave to the persons who at her decease should be archdeacon of Chester, rector of Stockport and vicar of Prestbury £1,000 on similar trust, for the benefit of the poor of the township of Poynton. And she gave to the persons last mentioned £500 upon similar trust for the benefit of the poor of the township of Worth. The same donor also gave £1,200 for the benefit of the inmates of the six almshouses.

Lady Warren Bulkely died 23rd February 1826 and the legacies were laid out in the purchase of £2,771 13s 1d Three per cent reduced annuities, the dividends on which amount to £83 2s 10d, £45 7s 2d part of this sum is divided among the six inhabitants of the almshouses. The remainder £37 15s 8d is given away by the rector of Stockport, or expended in food and clothing as the necessities of the case may require.

Lost Charities William Hulme gave land producing 10s per annum, Elizabeth Steed gave £100, as an apprenticing fund, and John Prestnall gave £30 to the poor. Nothing appears to be now known of any of these charities, although mentioned on the Benefaction table, in the church.

BRAMALL or **BRAMHALL**, formerly written *Bromhale*, is a considerable township 3 miles S. from Stockport, which comprises 2606 acres of land, the principal owners of which are Lady Davenport, Chas. Higginbotham, Esq. Peter Pownall, Esq. Mrs. Davenport, of Capes-thorne, Thomas Isherwood, Esq., and Lloyd Bamford Hesketh Bamford, Esq., and others. In 1841, there were 275 houses, and 1395 inhabitants. Population, in 1801, 763; in 1831, 867. Rateable value, £4,880 13s. 4d. The soil is mostly a stiff clay, with about one third under the plough, and the farmers, in most instances, send their milk to Stockport. This place at a very early period, was possessed by a family who adopted the local name, in the reign of Henry II, Hamo de Masci confirmed to Matthew de Bromholl, the manor of Bromhall; and about the reign of Henry V., the property passed with an heiress to John Davenport, Esq., in whose family it has since continued.

The **HALL**, a fine old mansion of timber and plaster, painted black and white, is picturesquely seated on the knoll of a hill, the foot of which is washed by a small rivulet, some parts of it appear to be of as early a date as the time of King Edward the fourth whose family devises are in some of the chapel windows. The *Entrance Hall* is spacious and fitted up with antique oak furniture, the walls of which are hung round with family portraits and ancient armour; over the mantle piece are the arms of the Bramhall and Davenport families beautifully carved with the date 1609; in the centre of the hall stands a large billiard table. The *Drawing Room* forms a wainscotted square of nearly thirty six feet, it is elegantly furnished in the ancient style, with rich carved oak furniture and cabinets of the most costly and exquisite workmanship. The ceiling is enriched with pendant ornaments, and the wainscoting is hung with family portraits. The drawing room is approached by a spiral staircase of solid oak, and the doors are curiously carved. The *Paradise Room*, a small bedchamber south from the drawing-room, contains a bed hung with tapestry, on which is worked in worsted the history of the Fall. This piece of work was commenced in 1610 and completed in 1614 by Dame Dorothy Davenport; the room is wainscotted, and fitted up with oak furniture. The *Banqueting Room* is a noble apartment, 42 feet in length and 21 feet in width; the roof is of wood, enriched with quatrefoils, and the walls are of plaster and oak in pannels; it is furnished with a massive side-board of carved oak. At the south angle is the *Domestic Chapel*, an ancient structure, with a flat roof supported by brackets; in it are the arms of Bramhall, Davenport, and several of the Cheshire gentry. Its erection is attributed to the time of Richard III. The Hall is now the seat of Dame Maria Lady Davenport.

The Macclesfield Branch of the London and North Western Railway intersects the township for upwards of a mile, and has a station at Pownall green, about four miles from Stockport. An ancient house at Pownall green is the residence and property of Peter Pownall, Esq.

HAZLE GROVE, formerly called **Bullock Smithy**, is a populous hamlet, two miles south

from Stockport, in the several townships of Bramall, Norbury, Bosden, and Torkington; it stretches nearly a mile in length, and is principally situated in Bramall and Bosden, the houses on the east side of the road being for the most part in Bosden, and those on the west in Bramall. Here the Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel and Sunday school. The Independent Chapel was built in 1827, at a cost of about £800, and will hold about 400 hearers. Both these chapels are in Bosden. There is a cotton factory and a mill for throwing silk, and some of the inhabitants are employed in the manufacture of silk by hand loom.

Bramall Moor and Kits Moss were inclosed about twenty years ago; the former contained upwards of 40 acres.

BOSDEN, a hamlet in the township of Handforth, although nearly five miles from that place, is severed by the township of Bramall intervening. The population and acres of the whole township are given with Handforth-cum-Bosden.

BREDBURY township and populous village, situate $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.E. by N. from Stockport contains 2407 acres of land, and in 1841 had 584 houses, and 3301 inhabitants; Population, in 1801, 1958; in 1831, 2374. The manor of Bredbury was anciently held under the Stockports, by the family of Bedbury; and the Stockports held it under the Barony of Dunham Massey, by the service of finding a man with a sack and pike for the wars. The heiress of the Bredburys brought a moiety of this manor to the Ardens, the other moiety was for several generations in the Davenport. J. Howard is now the lord of the manor, and a considerable landowner. Joshua Bruckshaw, Esq., James Ashton, Esq., Robert Ashton, Esq., Mr. John Wright, Mr. Bruckshaw Ryle, and Mr. John Vaudry are also proprietors.

The **CHURCH**, St. Mark, situate at Butterhouse green, a handsome structure of freestone, in the early English style, consists of nave, chancel, and side aisles, with a tower surmounted with pinnacles, and was erected in 1848, at a cost of £3,000, towards which the Church Commissioners gave £250; the Incorporated Society, £230; Chester Diocesan Society, £350; and John Sidebotham, Esq., of Hyde, gave the site and £250. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners have endowed the Church with £150 per annum. There are 862 sittings, of which 520 are free. The side aisles are separated from the nave by five pointed arches, and the whole has a very chaste and neat appearance. The living is a perpetual curacy in the patronage of the Crown and Bishop alternately; Rev. James Whittaker is incumbent. A convenient School-room has just been erected on the south side of the Church-yard.

The **INDEPENDENT CHAPEL**, Hatherlow, is a neat gothic edifice erected in 1846, at a cost of upwards of £2,500. It is built of freestone, with hewn quoins and cornices, has a short steeple, and will hold 650 hearers. The interior is neatly fitted up and has side and end galleries: Rev. Thomas Coward is the minister. The old Presbyterian Chapel, built in 1706, is situated a short distance from the new structure, and is used for a Sunday School. The new Chapel is built on part of the site of the burial ground belonging to the old Chapel. A residence for the minister adjoins the old fabric. There is a Sunday School for girls at Hatherlow, erected in 1830. The Wesleyan Methodists have a Chapel, built in 1846 at Woodley. The Primitive Methodists Chapel was erected in 1835. Bredbury School, is an ancient building with a residence for the teacher. It is supported by subscriptions and the pence of the children; about 70 attend. There is a singular grave at Hatherlow, of a Dis-senting clergyman, the Rev. R. Robinson, who was interred some sixty years ago. The grave is a brick building, without roof, of about 15 feet square and 12 feet high, with a strong door in the centre of one side. The tradition is, that Mr. Robinson left his property to his daughter as long as she continued to see him every day. To this end she caused a glass to be placed in the top of the coffin, so that any one could see him who looked down. A line of trees was planted on each side of the path from the house, which is about 100 yards distant from the grave. The office of daily seeing her deceased parent is said to have been faithfully performed by Miss Robinson,

There are several collieries in the township, but the coal is mostly of an inferior quality, and used for engines. **WOODLEY MILLS**, an extensive establishment for spinning and manufacturing cotton, was erected about 1830. James Ashton and Brothers, now carry on the works, in which are engines equal to 140 horse power. The following are the principal places in the township, with their distances and bearings from the Church:—**HATHERLOW**, a hamlet 1 mile S. **WOODLEY**, a populous district extending E. from the Church. **BUTTERHOUSE GREEN**, the houses in the immediate vicinity of the New Church. **CASTLE HILL**, a number of scattered houses W.W. by N. The Peak Forest Railway intersects the township, and the Manchester and Buxton Railway, now in course of formation, will run in a line not far from the canal.

HARDEN HALL, the ancient seat of the Ardens, once a fine old mansion, but now delapidated, is the property of Robert Ashton, Esq. It was built about the middle of the 16th century, and is rendered conspicuous by a turret which rises considerably above the rest of the roof. The outer walls are still perfect, but the floors have fallen,—the windows are in ruins, and the vestiges of grandeur, the antique furniture, and some fine old paintings were removed upwards of 20 years ago. **HARRYTON HALL**, $\frac{3}{4}$ mile S. from the Church, an ancient residence mantled with Ivy, is the seat of Joshua Bruckshaw, Esq. It has the date 1671

over the entrance; and contains some fine specimens of antique oak furniture, beautifully carved. BREDBURY HALL has been modernized within the last few years; it is the residence of John Pender, Esq. WOOD BANK is a handsome mansion on the west side of river, in the modern style, the residence of Henry Marsland, Esq. HIGH FIELD HOUSE is a pleasantly situated residence occupied by James Ashton, Esq.

The Parliamentary returns state that Margaret Ardern gave £200, the interest to be paid in apprentice fees for poor children of Bredbury and Stockport; and that Frances Ardern gave £150 in 1758, for the like purpose. Lord Alvanley pays a yearly sum of £8, for apprenticing one child in Bredbury, and £7 to the bailiff of the estate, to be by him given among the poor. These sums are considered to be paid on account of some charitable bequest of some of the Ardern family.

BRINNINGTON, a considerable township, embraces the populous district of Portwood, which forms a suburb on the north east side of Stockport, and is included in that borough. The township extends 2 miles N.E. from Stockport, and contains 810 acres of land. In 1841, there were 1277 houses, and 5331 inhabitants. Population in 1801, 890; in 1831, 3987. The Rev. William Fox, and Cephas Howard, Esq., are the principal land-owners. The former is lord of the manor. Brinnington will form a distinct parish as soon as the new Church, now in course of erection, is completed. It is situated at the extremity of Portwood, on the south east side of the Brinnington road, and will cost about £3,300. It

is in the perpendicular style, and is to have a tower and spire. The patronage will be vested in the Crown and Bishop alternately.

The manor of Brinnington was anciently given by Hamon de Massey to Robert Fitzwaltheof, for which Robert was to serve him in his chamber, and to carry his arms and clothes, when the Earl of Chester, in person, went into Wales; Hamon was to find him a sumptre man and a sack whilst with the army, and Robert was to swear that if Hamon was in captivity, he should help to set him free, and also help to make his son a Knight, and to marry his eldest daughter, in token of which Robert gave Hamon a gold ring. **PORTWOOD HALL**, the manor house of Brinnington, is now occupied by Mr. Thomas Hill, surveyor and land agent. There are several genteel residences, modern erections, on the Brinnington road, which are occupied by the manufacturers of Stockport. The residents in Portwood are included in the Stockport directory. The following are the principal residents in the scattered parts of the township.

DIRECTORY.—Edward Barlow, surveyor of highways; Mr. John Fowden, Rev. DISLEY township, chapelry, and well built village, very pleasantly situated on the Manchester and Buxton road, $6\frac{1}{4}$ miles S.E. from Stockport, contains several good inns and a fine old church; the bold undulating district with which the village is surrounded abounds with scenery of great diversity and picturesque beauty. The township comprises 2,523 acres of land, mostly a thin soil, exposed, and cold; Thomas Legh, Esq. is owner and lord of the manor. In 1841 here were 438 houses, and 2,191 inhabitants; population in 1801 995, in 1831 2,087. Rateable value £5,925. The rent charge amounts to £96 per annum. A family which took its name from the township, held lands at an early period, by the service of being foresters of Macclesfield; these land seem to have been passed by inheritance, to Suttons and Sherds, or Sherts. The last mentioned family, which was settled at Disley as early as the reign of Henry VI., continued to reside at Shert hall in this township, in 1662.

The **CHAPEL** dedicated to All Saints, is a handsome structure in the gothic style, with a tower and six bells; it was rebuilt, consecrated, and made parochial in the year 1558, since that period it has been rebuilt, except the tower, and it was enlarged and beautified by Richard and Thomas Orford, Esq. in 1835, who also gave a fine organ, which cost upwards of £300. The east window is richly beautified with stained glass illustrative of scripture history. The living is a perpetual curacy, returned at £130, in the patronage of Thomas Legh, Esq., and enjoyed by the Rev. Noble Wilson. Among the memorials is a handsome monument to Richard Orford, Esq., very finely sculptured. A flag-stone remembers Joseph Watson, buried June 3, 1753, aged 104 years. He was park keeper at Lyme upwards of 64 years.

The **NATIONAL DAY AND SUNDAY SCHOOL** is a substantial stone building, which was enlarged in 1834, and endowed by Elleo, Richard, and Thomas Orford, with the annual sum of £50, payable out of the Wood farm estate at Marple, £30 of the said gift to be divided among six female monitors, £5 to be distributed in bread to the parents of the children upon Whit-Sunday, £7 among the singers attending the school, and a yearly sum of £8 to be expended in bibles as rewards for the scholars. About 600 children attend the Sunday School. The National Day School has an attendance of about 100 scholars.

The **WESLEYAN METHODIST SUNDAY SCHOOL**, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile S.E. from the church, was built by Mr. Heald; Mr. Vicars has presented a library of upwards of 500 volumes, for the use of the school and the workmen at his mill. The school is used as a place of worship by the Methodists on a Sunday. The Wesleyans have also a Day and Sunday School situated about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from the church.

THE DISLEY MUTUAL IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY occupy rooms in Crescent row, and has about forty members; it comprises class rooms, library, and reading room, furnished with newspapers and the most popular periodicals of the day for the use of the members. Mr. James Ralston is president. The institution has the patronage of the principal gentlemen in the neighbourhood.

The following are the principal houses, with their bearing and distances from the church. CHESHIRE VIEW, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile N. W., a handsome stuccoed villa, the residence of Legh Slater, Esq. WATER SIDE HOUSE, 1 mile S.E., the residence of Archibald Vicars, Esq. SPRING BANK COTTAGE, $\frac{1}{4}$ mile E., in the occupancy of Mr. James Ralstone. The PARSONAGE is a neat residence a little W. from the church. Grove Mill and Waterside Mill are two extensive establishments for spinning and manufacturing cotton goods. Calico printing and candle wick manufacturing are also carried on in this township. The extensive establishment of Messrs. Bucan and Welsh, calico printers, are situate on the Derbyshire side of the Goyt, which here bounds the county. The Peak Forest Canal intersects the township for several miles.

CHARITIES.—*Thomas Off*, in 1629, left a rent charge of £1 3s. 4d. to be distributed in bread on christmas day. The Poor's Land consists of about three statute acres, let for £4 4s. a year; an old deed, of the time of Charles I., appears to relate to this property. *Francis Gaskell* left the sum of £50 for the benefit of the poor. This legacy was held by Thomas Claythton, agent to Colonel Legh, till 1822, when he became bankrupt, since which nothing has been paid, and the charity, it is feared, is irrecoverably lost. *William Gaskell* gave £10 to Disley Church, and to Disley School, to be divided equally between them. *Thomas Gaskell*, in 1736, gave £100 to be laid out on land, at the discretion of Peter Legh, Esq. and Mr. John Gaskell, of the interest, 20s. to be paid to the minister of Disley and £3 10s. to the master of Disley School for the instruction of six poor children from Lyme Handley. The parliamentary returns state that *Alexander Knowles* left £1 10s. to the poor, of which nothing is now known.
